## STARS and the Hamburger

The club's special event station made a total of 533 contacts during the two days.

The hottest band was 10 meters on Saturday when we made 180 contacts from the Nike Base and could have made even more if we had had fresh operators during the late afternoon and early evening. 10 meters was dead on Sunday, so we spent most of the day on 15 meters, working a total of 108 contacts. In all, a total of 295 contacts were made from the Nike Base by Terry KM4XZ, Ed KB2KVA, John KA2RFT, Norm KD2KK, Bob KB2HWY and Steve KB2EQV. Also, there giving her moral support was Mary N2KWD

The remaining contacts were worked by members using the club's call from their home stations. This included Gene KE2LO, Guz WB2EZU, Bob KB2JHY, Mark N2LAB and Warren N2INA. This gave us a lot of coverage on 20,40 and 80 meters.

So far, approximately 200 requests for the special certificates have been received with many personal notes about the event. As expected, the 10 -meter people (who included more of the newer amateurs) were the most enthusiastic requestors for the certificates. We expect to be mailing the certificates soon.

A simulated airplane crash at Niagra Falls International Airport (based upon the real one that happened at Sioux City, Iowa) will suddenly challenge local emergency response agencies with the huge task of taking care of over 200 victims.

## STARS $\mathbb{E}$ ARRL Memberships

Membership in STARS is open to anyone with an interest in amateur radio; an amateur radio license is not required.

Membership applications may be obtained from Frank Modzelewski WG2H, 1818 Clinton Street, Buffalo, NY 14206, from the newsletter editor or from board members.

Annual dues are payable on January 1 and are $\$ 15$ for a single membership, \$23 for family memberships and \$8 for a student membership (through grade 12). The dues are pro-rated on a monthly basis for new members plus there is an initiation fee of $\$ 5$ when first applying to the club. For example, a new member joining in July would pay $\$ 7.50$ ( 6 months $X \$ 1.25 /$ month $)$ plus the $\$ 5.00$ initiation fee for a total of $\$ 12.50$.

Applications should be returned to Frank WG2H along with the appropriate dues. The applications will be reviewed and voted on by the Board of Directors at their business meeting. The applications are then voted on by the general membership at the next regular club meeting.
