STARS Repeater WB2ELW/R

There has been a lots of recent activity surrounding STARS repeater, WB2ELW/R.

Having experienced problems with moisture getting into the commercial fiberglass antenna which we have been using for the repeater, a decision was made at the September club meeting to buy and install a new antenna.

Repeater Chairman Bill NZGAO researched the problem with various repeater owners and concluded that we should try a Hustler G7 antenna with a 7 dB gain. This particular type of antenna seemed to have an excellent track record over time.

On Saturday, September 14, the old antenna came down and the new one went up. Helping with this was Bill NZGAO, Gary KBZESN, Bob WA2IQX, Jake KBZNNN, Jack KBZESM, Craig WA2PCH, Norm KDZKK, Bob KB2HWY, Mary NZKWD and Bob KBZJHY.

Reaction to the new antenna has been very favorable. Numerous people have indicated that reception into previously marginal areas has improved significantly.

Also discussed at the September meeting was the need to look into purchasing a back-up repeater for the 147.09 machine. At the moment, we have no back-up repeater. Therefore, a technical problem could put the repeater off the air for an extended period of time while the repeater was being repaired. Bob WA2IQX and Bill N2GAO are researching the availability and cost of a solid-state back-up to our current repeater and will report to the club as soon as they are in a position to make a recommendation.

October Meeting

STARS October meeting will begin at 7:30 PM on October 3 at the Hamburg Youth Center (Prospect Street and Hawkins Street). Anyone interested in amateur radio is invited to attend.

For several months, the club has been reviewing a potential new site for the 147.09 repeater. The timing of any relocation of the repeater would be some time in the future and is indefinite at this time.

A robot test station is now in operation on 446.5 Mhz simplex to test the potential new site. To conduct a test, give your call and announce that you are testing, and then hit the # key for a minimum of I second. If you are within range of the repeater, you will hear a brief voice announcement asking you to note the equipment and power level you used for the test and how well you received the signal. This information should be relayed to Bill N2GAO.

This initial test is being conducted on UHF rather than 2 meters because of the availability of UHF antennas already up on the tower. To install a 2 meter antenna on this tall tower will

STARS & ARRL Memberships

Membership in STARS is open to anyone with an interest in amateur radio; an amateur radio license is not required.

Membership applications may be obtained from Frank Modzelewski WG2H, 1818 Clinton Street, Buffalo, NY 14206, from the newsletter editor or from board members.

Annual dues are payable on January 1 and are \$15 for a single membership, \$23 for family memberships and \$8 for a student membership (through grade 12). The dues are pro-rated on a monthly basis for new members plus there is an initiation fee of \$5 when first applying to the club. For example, a new member joining in July would pay \$7.50 (6 months X \$1.25/month) plus the \$5.00 initiation fee for a total of \$12.50.
