Amateur Radio and the World University Games

As you all realize, the World University Games will come to WNY this coming summer, from July 7 through the 18th. The amateurs of WNY have been called upon to be a major part of this operation.

We have been asked to assist with the

Emergency Medical part of the operation. Our primary duty will be to help maintain, via packet radio, information relating to medical emergencies which may arise.

There will be 24 venues through out WNY and Canada. Each which will require amateur operations to provide communications for 10 to 14 hours per day. This equates to an enormous amount of man hours required. Packet radio is the primary emphasis, not verbal communications. Volunteers need not be part of ARES/RACES to participate; any amateur with a Technician class or higher license may participate. Everything will be set up for you, and no prior packet experience is necessary.

The games will receive local, national and world wide attention, as will the amateurs who participate. The amateur community can be

STARS & ARRL Memberships

Membership in STARS is open to anyone with an interest in amateur radio; an amateur radio license is not required.

Membership applications may be obtained by sending a SASE to Frank Modzelewski WG2H, 1818 Clinton Street, Buffalo, NY 14206, from the newsletter editor or from board members.

Annual dues are payable on January 1 and are \$15 for a single membership, \$23 for family memberships and \$8 for a student membership (through grade 12). The dues are pro-rated on a monthly basis for new members plus there is an initiation fee of \$5 when first applying to the club. For example, a new member joining in July would pay \$7.50 (6 months X \$1.25/month) plus the \$5.00 initiation fee for a total of \$12.50.

Applications should be returned to Frank WG2H along with the appropriate dues. The applications will be reviewed and voted on by the Board of Directors at their business meeting. The applications are then voted on by the general membership at the next regular club meeting.
