Nike Base HF Club Station

STARS & ARRL Memberships

Membership in STARS is open to anyone with an interest in amateur radio; an amateur radio license is not required.

Membership applications may be obtained by sending a SASE to Frank Modzelewski WG2H, 1818 Clinton Street, Buffalo, NY 14206, from the newsletter editor or from board members.

Annual dues are payable on January 1 and are \$15 for a single membership, \$23 for family memberships and \$8 for a student membership (through grade 12). The dues are pro-rated on a monthly basis for new members plus there is an initiation fee of \$5 when first applying to the club. For example, a new member joining in July would pay \$7.50 (6 months X \$1.25 min) plus the \$5.00 initiation fee for a total of \$12.50.

Applications should be returned to Frank WG2Halong with the appropriate dues. The applications will be reviewed and voted on by the Board of Directors at their business meeting. The applications are then voted on by the general membership at the next regular club meeting.

Thanks to Bob, WAZIQX for covering for me at the last minute for last month's meeting, when I left town. Dave Rodman, KNZM is again to be congratulated for another excellent program, this time on the construction of a super station!!

This month's presentation will be given by Bob, W2WVC, on EMI (Electro Magnetic Interference), which includes RFI (Radio Frequency Interference), a more commonly known term to most hams.

His talk will include not only amateur induced RFI problems, but associated RFI eminating from devices, external rectifiers, etc. that interfere with amateur radio reception!!

At the end of his talk I expect each of you will understand differential vs common-mode conducted (line) interference, and how to eliminate it, along with front end overload vs spurious eminations vs harmonic interference. Don't worry, his talk will NOT be highly technical, and will be quite pleasant, and enjoyable. He has a tendency to be very entertaining in his presentation, and will illustrate his work with the FCC with some local examples!

WOW: Having trouble with copying code? How would you like to try a system that starts you off at 20 to 30 WPM??? This system has been around for quite some time; in fact, the ARRL has used this system and still does for all its CW practice sessions on the air. It is easy and fast. It is known as the "Farnsworth Method". The letters are formed at 15 to 18 WPM, but sent with 5 WPM spacing. New FCC Communication Rules

In last month's newsletter, we outlined the basic new rules that the FCC has adopted (effective September 13) for determining permitted communications on amateur radio. This month we will talk about some examples to show how the new vs. old rules differ. Much of this is based upon material in the August 15, 1993 issue of WSYI REPORT.

Under the old rules, no amateur station was allowed to transmit any communications which promoted the business or commercial affairs of any party. In other words, if anyone profited financially, it was an illegal transmission. It didn't make any difference if the party was a commercial business or a non-profit institute. Of course, there was an exception granted allowing hams to have swap nets for amateur radio related items.

Under the new rules, the transmissions would be prohibited if they were for the pecuniary benefit of the station controller or his or her employer. Transmissions which profited someone else could now be acceptable so long as they don't violate any other rules. An example of this quoted by William T. Cross in the Personal Radio Branch of the FCC was that you couldn't order bibles for a church over the air if you were an employee of that church, but an unpaid church member could provide the communications, if there was no pecuniary

Another important phase of this revolves around whether amateur is being used as an alternative to another authorized radio service. Under the old rules, this was allowable only for emergency communications. Now, amateur-to-amateur communications which could reasonably be furnished alternatively through other radio services will be allowed, but not on a regular basis. What is a regular basis? The FCC declined to define this!

advantage to the amateur.

Does this mean that a taxi service could switch over to using amateur radios because they were cheaper than business radios? No, this would certainly be viewed as a "regular" basis; and they would also fail the test of the control operator or his or her employer having a pecuniary benefit.

A 2-meter personal business conversation where a transaction was involved used to be prohibited. Now, it may be allowable if it meets all the other rules. The rules used to prohibit the business and commercial affairs of any entity. Since a club is an entity, you technically couldn't conduct club business over-the-air. Now, conducting club business on-the-air is now O.K.

Have the FCC members lost their minds and are they trying to ruin amateur radio? Probably not (of course, nothing is for certain!) They are for the most part trying to allow amateurs to have more freedom without losing control to blatantly commercial transactions. Since the FCC chose not to give examples of permitted and prohibited communications, you can bet that there are going

Club Repeaters
