STARS & ARRL Memberships

Membership in STARS is open to anyone with an interest in amateur radio; an amateur radio license is not required.

Membership applications may be obtained by sending a SASE to Frank Modzelewski WG2H, 1818 Clinton Street, Buffalo, NY 14206, from the newsletter editor or from board members.

Annual dues are payable on January 1 and are \$15 for a single membership, \$23 for family memberships and \$8 for a student membership (through grade 12). The dues are pro-rated on a monthly basis for new members plus there is an initiation fee of \$5 when first applying to the club. For example, a new member joining in July would pay \$7.50 (6 months X \$1.25/month) plus the \$5.00 initiation fee for a total of \$12.50.

Applications should be returned to Frank WG2H along with the appropriate dues. The applications will be reviewed and voted on by the Board of Directors at their business meeting. The applications are then voted on by the general membership at the next regular club meeting.

SAREX

The STS-58 shuttle astronauts have found time to conduct both school contacts and general QSO passes with amateurs during this mission. They also have had their packet robot station on at times which automatically assigns a QSO number to the connecting station and then disconnects to await the next station.

For once the inclination of their orbit is bringing them up far enough north for the WNY hams to hear them.

The chances aren't real good of making a contact due to the short passes and great competition, but you can get a great QSL card for just submitting a listener's report of what and when you heard. You should be able to hear them with what ever

you use for voice or packet around town.

Listen for the astronauts on 145.55 Mhz. However, don't ever transmit on this frequency!

The shuttle operates split frequency for both voice and packet, so they won't hear you on 145.55 Mhz but all the local people trying to hear them will hear you and won't appreciate it!

To talk to the shuttle on voice, you use an uplink frequency of 144.91, 144.93, 144.95, 144.97 or 144.99 Mhz. They could be listening on any of these frequencies.

For packet, you use an uplink frequency of 144.49.

There is a great article on the SAREX missions in the November issue of QST.

Lockport ARA (LARA) will hold test sessions on January 29 and April 30, 1994 in Lockport, NY. For information, call Judy Cianchetti at 751-9223.

Most sessions except for STARS do not allow walk-ins, so call ahead and make a reservation.

Commercial License Examinations

Examinations for radiotelephone and radio telegraph commercial licenses will commence on Friday, Nov. 5 and are tentatively scheduled for the WNY region on the first friday of each month.

Commercial radiotelephone licenses are required for repair, maintain, and adjust ship, radar, coast, and aircraft radio equipment. Radiotelegraph licenses are required for operation of coast and ship stations in the maritime services.
