STARS & ARRL Memberships

Membership in STARS is open to anyone with an interest in amateur radio; an amateur radio license is not required. Membership applications may be obtained by sending a SASE to Frank Modzelewski WGZH, 1818 Clinton Street, Buffalo, NY 14206, from the newsletter editor or from board members.

Annual dues are payable on January 1 and are \$15 for a single membership, \$23 for family memberships and \$8 for a student membership (through grade 12). The dues are pro-rated on a monthly basis for new members plus there is an initiation fee of \$5 when first applying to the club. For example, a new member joining in July would pay \$7.50 (6 months X \$1.25/month) plus the \$5.00 initiation fee for a total of \$12.50.

Applications should be returned to Frank WG2H along with the appropriate dues. The applications will be reviewed and voted on by the Board of Directors at their business meeting. The applications are then voted on by the general membership at the next regular club meeting.

"PACKET RACKET"

an introduction to packet radio, part 6

In this installment, we will finish up on the LIST command, and move onto the READ command. If you practiced the LIST command, and typed: ? L, you have seen all the options available with this command.

When you connect to the BBS, you will receive the log-on message, which is several paragraphs in length, and is used to convey

important information and BBS changes to our users. Be sure to read this section. It may seem to be the same each time you connect, but will often have a new line added every few weeks.

You will then be told if new messages are waiting to be read. If there is more than one message waiting to be read, I would suggest listing them, to see how large they are, so you don't wind up overloading your scrollback buffers in your tne by reading them all at once! To list them, type: LM (which stands for "List Mine"... remember our lesson last week?).

Once you see the list, which will give you the headers, including message size, originating author, etc., etc., you can read them by typing: RM, which as you guessed stands for "Read Mine". You have now just started off using our next command, the READ command.

To get more help on this command, type: ? R, which just as for the LIST command will give you information on the different options of the READ command that exist. You will find these to be very similar to the LIST command options.

To try one or two examples:

R 160137 will tell the BBS you wish to read message # 160137. R 160137 160234 160365 will tell the BBS you wish to read messages #'s 160137, then 160234, and then 160365. You will get these sent ALL AT ONCE, in that order. Again, be sure the message sizes are not too big, or they will scroll beyond the limits of your scrollback buffers, and you will have to re-request the messages one or two at a time.

R> KE2VW will read all public messages being

sent to KE2VW, whereas; R < KE2VW will read all public messages being sent out from KE2VW. Again remember, you can read any bulletins being sent to/from any callsign, using this format, but private mail will not be shown using this, unless you are using your call. You could NOT in the above example read any private messages from others to KE2VW, or from KE2VW to others, except those to/from yourself!

Practice using the READ command, and you will see how simple it is to use!

Now that you have read your messages, and bulletins of interest (following the LIST command), now what? The first thing you need to do is to kill off any private mail to you, so it doesn't clutter up the BSS (using valuable memory). You do this with the KILL command. To see its limited options available, type: ? K, which will list its uses.

Essentially, KM will "Kill Mine", which relates to your personal messages. If, for example, you read two messages, and didn't know a new one had just arrived, typing: KM would result in a message being sent to you that message #xxxxxx is killed, and "you cannot kill message #xxxxxx". This is a safeguard to prevent you from killing messages sent to you, before reading them!

K 160137 will kill that message, ONLY if it was a message you originated, or was one sent to you. You cannot kill any messages sent by anyone else other than yourself. This applies to private messages, and bulletins alike. Additionally, once the mail has been forwarded off the BBS (remember the headers PF, or BF?), killing it will have NO effect on the message at the other BBS(s) it is sent to. It is too late.

Frank Modzelewski WG2H Secretary Dave Baco WA2TVT Director Vern Siegel AA2AC Director Shane Brady WB2WPM Now we are getting comfortable with listing messages, reading them, and where appropriate, killing them, so when do we get the exciting part, sending messages?.. Right now!

To start off with sending messages, we need to talk about the US Postal System. If you try sending off a letter, without including the street, city/town, state, or zip code; you will get your letter returned to you. Likewise for packet, there is a complete address, known as the hierachial address system. This is composed of the callsign of the full service BBS that your intended recipient of the message uses, along with that BBS's local, area (state), regional (country), and national (continent) designators, each separated by a period.

For example, if you were to send a message from the XX2XX BBS, to KM4XZ, whose home is the KEZVW Bull service BBS, you would address it as: S KM4XZ @
KEZVW.#WNY.NY.USA.NA. This translates into SEND a message (in this case a private message, which we will get into shortly) to KM4XZ, whose home BBS is KEZVW, #WNY -> located locally in WNY (the # means this entry is optional), NY -> in the area of New York State, USA -> in the region of the United States, NA -> in the continent of North America. Once you break it down it's not that hard, but we now have an easier way... the White Pages.

Like their phone company equivalent, the White Pages, are a listing, which in the case of packet are the complete H-addresses of a number of BBSs, and thousands of packet users. Whenever you register on a BBS, or send out a message, you are added to the White Pages database, which is then shared with other BBSs nationally.

The White Pages allow messages to be automatically addressed, so all you have to do is type: S KM4XZ in this example. The BBS will then state the message will be routed to KM4XZ @ KE2VW.#WNY.NY.USA.NA. Pretty neal: If the EAVYW.#WNY.NY.USA.NA. Pretty neal: If the packet system, you will get a message stating "Warning!! WP has no routing to callsign", where callsign is the call of the ham you were sending the message to. The SysOp will be sent a note after you finish typing your message, and will try to see if he/she can find some kind of routing, which is unlikely.

I would suggest before you try to send a message, you make sure the White Pages lists your intended recipient, by typing: I callsign, which will show you the White Page listing for that callsign, if one exists. If there is not one, save your typing, until you find if your ham friend has ever been on packet to begin with, and if so what his home BBS is! By typing I KM4XZ, for example, you will get: KM4XZ @ KE2VW.#WY.NY.USA.NA, which tells you it is safe to just address a message to KM4XZ, and the message will be automatically routed for you!

Now let's talk briefly about the SEND command. To see how this command can be used, type: ? S, which will show you its options. Typing; S callsign, is the same as typing: SP callsign, because in both cases, the BBS will know the message is to be private. This means only the sender, the recipient of the message, and the BBS SysOps along the way are able to read the message. Be aware that ANY user monitoring the frequency the sender is on, while he is sending the message (called uploading a message) to the originating BBS (the one from which the message started), can see the contents of the message. Once the message is onboard the BBS, and is sent from BBS to BBS, the users can no longer view the message.

In brief, if you want NO ONE to view your message, call your friend on the phone!!

Once you have typed the S callsign, and hit the enter key, the BBS will then prompt you for a message title. This title can be up to 30 characters (including spaces) in length. When we get to sending bulletins, you will see how important a good title can be getting others interested enough to read it, from the hundreds of other bulletins listed daily, but for now we are talking private messages only. The title should still be thought out, however.

Once you type the title, and hit enter, the BBS will tell you to type your message, and end with either a Z (which means typing the letter z while holding down the control key), or typing EX on the last line, by itself. For example:

Hi Terry: - OR -Message goes here... 73, Greg /ex Hi Terry: Message goes here ... 73, Greg

FCC Computer Gives New Look To Licenses

Amateurs receiving new or modified FCC licenses after June 8, 1994, should carefully note their expiration date. Only new (first) licenses or specific renewals have a full 10-year term.

Amateur license upgrades and changes of address, call sign, or name are processed with the original expiration date intact. That is, they are not automatically renewed for a new 10-year term.

The FCC, using newly installed computer software, is processing amateur licenses in this manner to conform with the way in which it processes all other Private Radio Service licenses

The FCC currently recommends that amateurs submit license renewal applications 60 to 90 days before their expiration date. The Commission said it intends eventually to mail license expiration notices to amateurs. In the meantime, the ARRL is sending license expiration notices to ARRL members, along with an FCC Form 610 and a return envelope addressed to the FCC's licensing division in Gettysburg, Pennsylvania.

Another difference in these

new licenses is the new
"TECH PLUS" category for
those who have qualified.
Persons upgrading from
Novice, or those who upgrade
from codeless Technician by
passing a Morse code exam, or persons who pass
the Novice and Technician written tests-plus a
Morse code test-will receive a license that reads
"TECH PLUS" under Operator Privileges.

Persons who became a Technician with HF privileges with a license begin date prior to June 8, 1994 must continue to retain their "Technician" license and "Certificate of Successful Completion of Examination" (CSCE) in order to show that TECH PLUS privileges are held.

Congratulations, you've just sent your first message!

To review your message, type: L < yourcall (in this example KE2VW), which will list all messages you wrote that are still active, or L> KM4XZ, which will list any messages addressed to KM4XZ, that you are allowed to read (that you wrote!). Remember, LM will not work here, as it is used to list messages TO your callsign, NOT From your callsign. Private messages, as opposed to bulletins, are kept active for three weeks from the time they were originated (uploaded to the local BBS) for messages addressed to other users of the local BBS; or for one day after the message is either forwarded off the local BBS (KE2VW) out into the system, or read by the recipients. In our next article, we will cover sending bulletins to the general packet community, which is a topic all in itself. That is the resource that is clearly the most used/abused in the BBS system. I will show you how to become a proficient bulletin author, one who will not be faced with any "flames" because of the way the bulletin is addressed/sent. I can't promise you will never receive a flame based on bulletin content, however. That's all part of packet!
