STARS & ARRL Memberships

Membership in STARS is open to anyone with an interest in amateur radio; an amateur radio license is not required. Membership applications may be obtained by sending a SASE to Judy Levan N2TEZ, 120 University Blvd., Depew, NY 14043, from the newsletter editor or from board members.

Annual dues are payable on January 1 and are \$21 for a single membership, \$27 for family memberships and \$8 for a student membership (through grade 12). The dues are pro-rated on a monthly basis for new members plus there is an initiation fee of \$5 when first applying to the club. For example, a new member joining in July would pay \$10.50 (6 months X \$1.75/mth) plus the \$5.00 initiation fee for a total of \$15.50.

Applications should be returned to Judy N2TEZ along with the appropriate dues. The applications will be reviewed and voted on by the Board of Directors at their business meeting. The applications are then voted on by the general membership at the next regular club meeting.

Radio Receivers Wanted


Our Buffalo VA recently took over the operation of the VA facility at Batavia. I have recommended to management that a ham radio and shortwave type listening post be set up for those patients who are interested in this type of recreational activity.

The Batavia Ham Radio Club (GRAMS) will be involved to assisting to provide ham radio classes as well as volunteer operators when it is set up. While many of the patients may not progress to passing amateur radio examinations, their interest in shortwave listening will give them something to do. The project has the full concurrance of our top management.

It would be nice to have a number of receivers set up with headphones so patients could monitor the shortwaves. The New York State Nursing Home at Batavia is also located ajacent to the Batavia VA. Many of these patients from this nursing home could visit the Ham/Shortwave listening post at the VA.

Repeater Corner

Thanks to Terry, KM4XZ, for spotting an article in December World Radio that sheds more light on the bleak prospects for future support of the Advanced Computer Controls (ACC) RC-85 controller we're using on the 2m repeater.

Per the story, ACC developed their repeater technology in the early 80's and eventually controlled up to 90% of the market. By the late 80's, their sales were dropping. In the last three years, their share of the market had dropped to about 10%. Newer technology allowed competitors to produce controllers at lower cost.

On July 25, 1995, ACC sold most of their holdings to Link Communications in Sydney, Montana. Allan Overcast, KF7FW, owns Link Communicatins. He bought the source code, vocabulary, parts and other proprietary information. "What we are going to do with it we have not yet totally decided", says Overcast. He says that when certain parts fail, there is little chance replacements can be found.

Overcast says his R.L.C-x controllers—which are designed with the latest technology available—may include some features previously found in ACC products. Overcast believes his already strong market share will grow even more as ACC owners find that parts are no longer available for their systems. He says that the Version 6 upgrade that ACC had been advertising has been shelved and will probably never be offered.

I wrote to Link Communications recently asking what support they will provide for ACC controllers and all I got back was a catalog for their RLC-x controllers. Our only consolation is that if our RC-85 failed irreparably, a comparable replacement could now be purchased for less than the approximately \$1,500 we've got in the RC-85 (original price + upgrades).



STARS Classes & VE Exams

The STARS Novice/Tech classes were successfully completed in November. Vern AA2AC was the primary instructor with Tony KB2OUT teaching the morse code portion and Greg KE2VW serving as a guest speaker.

On November 18, eight of the members of the classes took exams administered by a team of VE's not involved with giving the class. This team was headed by Dick W2UJR and included Paul W2JDK, John KF2JQ, and Jesse AA2UM, All eight class members qualified for their first licenses with one Novice, four Technicians and three Technician Plus. We also heard that another member of the class had qualified for a Technician license at an earlier exam.

Another VE team headed by Vern AA2AC and including Guz WB2EZU, Tony KB2OUT, Norm KD2KK and Terry KM4XZ tested walk-ins not associated with the class. Two candidates successfully upgraded to Technician Plus and Advanced, and three more qualified for their first Technician licenses.

Congratulations to all the successful candidates and thanks to all the instructors and VE's. This is a great example how experienced hams help new people qualify to get into the hobby.

We also hear that many of the class members will be joining STARS and/or other area clubs.

Most sessions except for STARS non-hamfest exams do not allow walk-ins, so call ahead and make a reservation.

Commercial Radio Examinations

Examinations are being given monthly for the following commercial radio licenses: General Radiotelephone Operator License; Marine Radio Operator Permit; First, Second and Third Class Radio Telegraph Operator's Certificate; Global Maritime Distressa and Safety System Operator's License; Global MaritimeDistress and Safety System Maintainer's License; and a radar endorsement for the above licenses.

Exams are held at the Aurora Middle School, 148 Aurora Street, Lancaster.

The Bozone Layer
