## STARS \& ARRL Memberships

Membership in STARS is open to anyone with an interest in amateur radio; an amateur radio license is not required. Membership applications may be obtained by sending a SASE to Judy Levan N2TEZ, 120 University Blvd., Depew, NY 14043, from the newsletter editor or from board members.

Annual dues are payable on January 1 and are $\$ 21$ for a single membership, $\$ 27$ for family memberships and $\$ 8$ for a student membership (through grade 12). The dues are pro-rated on a monthly basis for new members plus there is an initiation fee of $\$ 5$ when first applying to the club. For example, a new member joining in July would pay $\$ 10.50$ ( 6 months X $\$ 1.75 / \mathrm{mth}$ ) plus the $\$ 5.00$ initiation fee for a total of $\$ 15.50$.

Applications should be returned to Judy N2TEZ along with the appropriate dues. The applications will be reviewed and voted on by the Board of Directors at their business meeting. The applications are then voted on by the general membership at the next regular club meeting.

## "Q" CODES

These are three letter codes, all starting with the letter "Q" which are ciphers for complex phrases. With the introduction of audio transmission, the codes became redundant, but there are still those out there who speak the codes as a means of separating the cognoscenti from the uninitiated.

QSL
Originally "I acknowledge receipt", now:

1. A way to say "Yes" using three syllables instead of one.
2. An alternate to "Roger", the single most popular name among amateurs (Roger, Roger).
3. The amateur equivalent of a "Big Ten-four".

## QSO

This is supposed to mean "Can you communicate with .... direct or by relay?" but has now been converted into a word (pronounced KEWSO) to substitute for "chat". Thus, once licensed, you no longer chat to a friend, you have a Kewso with him (or her). Yet another advantage of your licence. You no longer have a house, apartment or address - you now have a QTH! Actually, it's supposed to mean "What is your position (or My position is) in latitude and longitude (or according to any other indication)."
