STARS & ARRL Memberships

Membership in STARS is open to anyone with an interest in amateur radio. A license is not required. Membership applications may be obtained by sending a SASE to Judy Levan N2TEZ, 120 University Blvd., Depew, NY 14043, from the newsletter editor or from board members.

Annual Dues are payable on January 1 and are \$21 for a single member-ship, \$27 for family memberships and \$8 for a student membership (through grade 12). The dues are pro-rated on a monthly basis for new members plus there is an initiation fee of \$5 when first applying to the club. For example, a new member joining in July would pay \$10.50 (6 months X \$1.75 per month) plus the \$5\$ initiation fee for a total of \$15.50.

FCC Puts Priority on Electronic Applications

When vanity call sign Gate 3 opens on August 6, 1997, the FCC will process electronic applications ahead of paper applications each day. Previously, the FCC did not distinguish in how it handled electronic and paper Form 610V applications. In recent months, the FCC has been receiving more electronic applications than paper applications. The FCC says it will process electronic applications, then paper applications received on any given day.

The FCC also has established a firm deadline for receipt of application fees to accompany electronic applications. After Gate 3 opens, fees for electronic applications must be

received by the FC's fiscal agent, Mellon Bank, within 10 days of the date of application will be dismissed. The fee will remain at \$30 for the ten-year term until September 15, 1997, when it will increase to \$50 for the ten-year term.



Applicants can find the electronic Form 610V on the FCC's Web site at http://www.fcc.gov/wtb/amradsrv.html. Electronic applications require a Form 159 for any method of payment. Mail payments accompanying electronic applications to Federal Communications Commission, Box 358994, Pittsburgh, PA 15251-5994.

Paper applications require an FCC Form 159 if payment is by credit card or if the application package contains multiple applications being paid for with one check. Individual applications do not require a Form 159 if payment is by personal check or money order.

Send paper applications containing payments to Federal Communications Commission, Box 358924, Pittsburgh, PA 15251-5924

To avoid processing delays, applicants should make sure the information on their license is up to date. If you have changed your name or address, you must file Form 610 with the FCC to request modification of your license to show the correct information. In the case of a club station, you must file Form 6108.

Gate 3 opens the vanity call sign program to Advanced class amateurs. The FCC has not said when it will open Gate 4, for General, Technician Plus, Technician and Novice class operators.

Several years later, I heard that Jerry did something you are never supposed to do in a restaurant business: he left the back door open one morning and was held up at gunpoint by three armed robbers. While trying to open the safe, his hand, shaking from nervousness, slipped off the combination. The robbers panicked and shot him. Luckily, Jerry was found relatively quickly and rushed to the local trauma center. After 18 hours of surgery and weeks of intensive care, Jerry was released from the hospital with fragments of the bullets still in his body.

I saw Jerry about six months after the accident. When I asked him how he was, he replied, "If I were any better, I'd be twins. Wanna see my scars?" I declined to see his wounds, but did ask him what had gone through his mind as the robbery took place. "The first thing that went through my mind was that I should have locked the back door," Jerry replied. "Then, as I lay on the floor, I remembered that I had two choices: I could choose to live, or I could choose to die. I chose to live." "Weren't you scared? Did you lose consciousness?" I asked: Jerry continued, "The paramedics were great. They kept telling me I was going to be fine. But when they wheeled me into the emergency room and I saw the expressions on the faces of the doctors and nurses, I got really scared. In their eyes, I read, 'He's a dead man.' I knew I needed to take action." "What did you do?" I asked. "Well, there was a big, burly nurse shouting questions at me," said Jerry. "She asked if I was allergic to anything. 'Yes,' I replied. The doctors and nurses stopped working as they waited for my reply...

I took a deep breath and yelled, 'Bullets!' Over their laughter, I told them, 'I am choosing to live. Operate on me as if

I am alive, not dead." Jerry lived thanks to the skill of his doctors, but also because of his amazing attitude. I learned from him that every day we have the choice to live fully. Attitude, after all, is everything.

IT'S KC5VPF IN FOR KC5KII ON MIR

NASA is making an eleventh-hour substitution for the next US astronaut to serve aboard the Russian Mir space station. Astronaut Wendy B. Lawrence, KCSKIT -a US Navy Commander -has been replaced by her backup, David A. Wolf, KCSVPF -a medical doctor -for the next long duration stay on Mir, starting in September. He'll take over from astronaut Michael Foale, KBSUAC, who's been aboard Mir since May. The change will enable Wolf to act as a backup crew member for spacewalks planned over the next several months to repair the damaged Spektr module on the Russian outpost. Wolf is scheduled to remain aboard Mir for four months. He had been scheduled to join the Mir crew on a subsequent shuttle-Mir docking mission in January.

NASA explained that Lawrence, 38, is not tall enough to fit the Orlan suit which Russian cosmonauts use for spacewalk tasks and has not undergone spacewalk training. Wolf, 41, does fit in the Orlan suit. Lawrence will continue training in the backup role, in the unlikely event that she is needed.

NASA also says it might delay the September launch of the shuttle Atlantis on the next shuttle-Mir docking mission, STS-86 by 10 days, so Wolf ean complete spacewalk training in Russia. That flight will deliver Wolf to the Russian station. Wolf is fully trained on both Mir and Soyuz capsule systems. Because of her knowledge and experience with Mir systems and with crew transfer logistics for the Mir, NASA also will fly Lawrence on STS-86.

In the wake of the damage to the Mir from a collision with a Progress rocket in June, NASA and Russian space officials have agreed that it would be mutually beneficial to have all three crew members on the Mir qualified for spacewalks. Foale was said to be disappointed to not get a chance to help repair the troubled space station after Russian crew member Vasily Tsibliev developed apparent heart problems. —NASA in the contract of the problems. —NASA in the contract of the problems. —NASA in the contract of the problems. —NASA in the problems.
