STARS Field Day 2002

STARS Field Day 2002 will be held at Glen Meadows Park in Hamburg on June 22-23. See page 4 for a map and directions to the site.

Field Day has a long tradition as an emergency prepared-

ness exercise, operating equipment "in the field" using power sources other than the commercial mains. As ARRL Chief Executive Officer David Su mner, K1ZZ, pointed out in his "It Seems to Us..." editorial in June 2002 *QST*, Field Day also presents an ideal opportunity to showcase Amateur Radio to the general public and to local officials and to convey an important message in the process.



"No matter what, there *will* be hams and they will be able to communicate with one another. *No matter what*," Sumner wrote.

Set-up for STARS Field Day will begin around 10 AM on Saturday morning. This can be a real learning experience as bows and arrows or slingshots are used to fire lines over trees to haul wire antennas into the air. Generators will be set up to provide emergency power.

Then at 2 PM on Saturday afternoon, the contesting will begin and the airwaves will come alive with stations from all over the US and Canada.

For the first time, they will be joined this year by stations from other parts of Central and South America, including the Caribbean.

June Meeting

This month's club meeting will begin at 7 PM on Thursday, June 6 at the Hamburg Youth Center (corner of Prospect Ave. and Hawkins

Ave.). All interested in amateur radio are invited to attend; neither club me mbership nor an amateur radio license are required.

for STARS Field Day 2002. He will answer your questions and will tell how you can help make the event a great success!

So come on out and see what is going on!

The contesting will continue until 2 PM on Sunday afternoon (rain or shine).

STARS will be running stations on CW and SSB. They may also be demonstrating other modes such as RTTY, SSTV, PSK31, etc.


Regardless of your experience, you are invited to come and operate or log stations or just to hang out and have fun! Even if you don't have HF privileges, you can operate under the supervision of another amateur with a higher class license. This is a great chance to learn how to improve your operating skills.

We will be planning a supper around 6 PM on Saturday. So, bring your lawn chairs, your family and your neighbors and come on out. The park provides very nice surroundings. Although the park normally closes at dusk, we have been given a permit to be there all night.

STARS & ARRL Memberships

Membership in STARS is open to anyone with an interest in amateur radio. A license is not required. Membership applications may be obtained by sending a SASE to Judy Levan N2TEZ, 120 University Blvd., Depew, NY 14043, from the newsletter editor or from board members.

Annual Dues are payable on January 1 and are \$21 for a single membership, \$27 for family memberships and \$8 for a student membership (through grade 12). The dues are pro-rated on a monthly basis for new members plus there is an initiation fee of \$5 when first applying to the club. For example, a new member joining in July would pay \$10.50 (6 months X \$1.75 per month) plus the \$5 initiation fee for a total of \$15.50.



Members who are joining ARRL for the first time or who are renewing their membership after a lapse of two years or more should send their ARRL membership forms to Jack Cullum, Jr. KB2ESM, 6871 Webster Rd., Orchard Park, NY 14127 along with a check made out to STARS. No extra cost to you and STARS benefits! STARS no longer benefits from normal yearly renewals, so they should be sent directly to the ARRL.

Gowanda School ARC

I would like to thank the members of STARS for agreeing to sponsor the Gowanda Central Schools' Amateur Radio Club. As a result, our school has been chosen as one of only ten schools in the nation that have received a complete amateur radio station funded by the "Big Project" through the American Radio Relay League.

I began the application process in November by forming a committee of interested teachers and staff. It just so happens that there are two licensed amateurs, two former licensees and one aspiring amateur who are all interested in the project, and are employed by the school district. We first visited the Pioneer Amateur Radio Club, under the direction of Joe Claus KB2JDB, to gather ideas and set goals for what our club could eventually become. "WOW," is the only word to describe the success of Joe's club. We were very much inspired to continue with the application for the "Big Project" grant. We left the visit tired, just from watching all of the activity that took place during a typical Pioneer Ham Club Meeting.

After months of editing, re-editing, and editing some more, we submitted our application to the ARRL. In April, our school received notification that we had been chosen as a

"pilot school" for the project. This means that our school will be receiving the following equipment, for free, to get our club started by next September: Yaesu FT-847, 160 meter-70 centimeter all-mode transceiver, matching power supply, Cushcraft R-6000 6-band vertical, Cushcraft triband VHF/UHF Yagi, 300 feet of LMR-400 coaxial cable with all connectors, and a manual MFJ antenna tuner. A key contributor to our school's effort, the physics teacher at the high school, has donated an antenna rotor. Our required "reference library" which consists of several ARRL public ations, has been purchased through money from another grant that the school district had previously been awarded. As we proceed with our club, the ARRL is asking us to submit a few lesson plans to them, as they are taught, which will help to develop a curriculum that can be used by all schools. We are also asked to submit photographs of our "club in action" for publicity. Certainly not too much to ask considering what we are getting in return!

I am truly sorry if I leave anyone out, but I want to acknowledge other donations that have been made to the Gowanda Central School ARC by STARS members. A special thanks to Joe KB2JDB, Bruce KC2GJX, Paul WB2KFL, and Gary KB2YJ. Again, thank you all for your support. I am very excited to move ahead with this project.

New STARS Field Day Site

STARS Field Day 2002 will be held at Glen Meadows Park on Olympiad Drive in Hamburg.

If you are coming from the north:

Go south on Route 75 (Camp Road) from the Hamburg exit of I-90.

Right on Sunset Drive Right on Byrd Drive Right on Brookwood Drive Left on Oak Hill Drive Left on Olympiad Drive into Glen Meadows Park.

If you are coming from the south:

Go north on Route 75 (Lake Street) from Main Street. Left on Pleasant Ave. Right on Sunset Drive Left on Byrd Drive. Right on Brookwood Drive Left on Oak Hill Drive Left on Olympiad Drive into Glen Meadows Park.

STARS Field Day site will center around the shelter which is at the far end of the park. This is a nice park with trees for our wire antennas. The park says it closes at dusk, but we have permission to be there all Saturday night.

Please note that some maps show Olympiad Drive connecting to Pleasant Ave. It doesn't, so you must enter the park from Oak Hill Drive.
