Shuttle *Columbia* Lost

On Saturday, February 1, 2003, the space shuttle *Columbia* broke up high over the state of Texas with the loss of all seven astronauts aboard. Three of the crew were amateur radio operators.

The STS-107 crew, headed by Commander Rick D. Husband, also included Pilot William C. McCool and Mission Specialists Kalpana Chawla, KD5ESI; David M. Brown, KC5ZTC; Laurel B. Clark, KC5ZSU, Michael P. Anderson, and Payload Specialist Ilan Ramon--a well-known Israeli Air Force pilot.

Club in East Texas reported on Saturday that their ARES group assisted students from the Stephen F. Austin State University Geographical Information System to locate and catalog shuttle debris. ARES volunteers also are following up on NASA-provided telemetry and radar information that indicates where debris might be found, Lewallen said. The ARES group is coordinating the entire effort, Lewallen said, adding that the recovery and cataloging effort was expected to continue for several more days. 

STARS & ARRL Memberships

Membership in STARS is open to anyone with an interest in amateur radio. A license is not required. Membership applications may be obtained by sending a SASE to Judy Levan N2TEZ, 120 University Blvd., Depew, NY 14043, from the newsletter editor or from board members.

Annual Dues are payable on January 1 and are \$21 for a single membership, \$27 for family memberships and \$8 for a student membership (through grade 12). The dues are pro-rated on a monthly basis for new members plus there is an initiation fee of \$5 when first applying to the club. For example, a new member joining in July would pay \$10.50 (6 months X \$1.75 per month) plus the \$5 initiation fee for a total of \$15.50.



Members who are joining ARRL for the first time or who are renewing their membership after a lapse of two years or more should send their ARRL membership forms to Jack Cullum, Jr. KB2ESM, 6871 Webster Rd., Orchard Park, NY 14127 along with a check made out to STARS. No extra cost to you and STARS benefits! STARS no longer benefits from normal yearly renewals, so they should be sent directly to the ARRL.

Robin Haighton VE3FRH, President of AMSAT, released the following statement, "It is with great sadness that I have learnt of the *Columbia* disaster. AMSAT has always been a strong supporter of the Shuttle program and of ARISS. We have had many interactions with the astronauts who have fearlessly ridden the shuttle into space, currently several are AMSAT members and supporters.

On this sad occasion on behalf of the Board of Directors, officers and members of AMSAT I wish to send our deep sympathy to the families, relatives and friends of those who undertook this *Columbia* mission, their understanding of the risks taken on this and other missions did not prevent them from performing at the highest level and unfortunately paying the ultimate price.

To our friends at NASA, we at AMSAT send our understanding and our sympathy, knowing that the exploration of space and carrying out important experiments for the benefit of humanity will continue to be your mission."

A special, private memorial service will be held Tuesday at the NASA Johnson Space Center in Houston. President and Mrs George W. Bush will attend the mid-day ceremony. "This is a private ceremony for family members, friends, and invited guests, along with NASA employees and contractors," NASA said.
