2004 ARRL Field Day Results

The ARRL has officially announced the results of the 2004 Field Day contest.

STARS had 30 people using the WB2ELW club call to rack up 939 QSO's for a total score of 3,594. This compared to STARS 2003 results of 667 QSO's for a total score of 2,776 points..

This placed STARS in first place in the WNY section for class 2A stations and in fifth place out of all 34 WNY stations in various classes.

Nationwide, STARS placed 131st out of 455 class 2A stations, and 462nd out of all 2250 stations in the competition.

STARS members had a good learning experience and lots of fun during 2004 Field Day and made an impressive gain on the results from 2003.

STARS & ARRL Memberships

Membership in STARS is open to anyone with an interest in amateur radio. A license is not required. Membership applications may be obtained by sending a SASE to Judy Levan N2TEZ, 120 University Blvd., Depew, NY 14043, from the newsletter editor or from board members.

Annual Dues are payable on January 1 and are \$21 for a single membership, \$27 for family memberships and \$8 for a student membership (through grade 12). The dues are pro-rated on a monthly basis for new members plus there is an initiation fee of \$5 when first applying to the club. For example, a new member joining in July would pay \$10.50 (6 months X \$1.75 per month) plus the \$5 initiation fee for a total of \$15.50.

Applications should be returned to Judy N2TEZ along with the appropriate dues. The applications

will be reviewed and voted on by the Board of Directors at the business meeting. The applications are then voted on by the general membership at the next regular club meeting.

Members who are joining ARRL for the first time or who are renewing their membership after a lapse of two years or more should send their ARRL membership forms to Jack Cullum, Jr. KB2ESM, 6871 Webster Rd., Orchard Park, NY 14127 along with a check made out to STARS. No extra cost to you and STARS benefits! STARS no longer benefits from normal yearly renewals, so they should be sent directly to the ARRL.

SKYWARN Recognition Day

The 2004 SKYWARN Recognition Day was held on December 4, 2004. This event is to celebrate the contributions that volunteer SKYWARN radio operators make to the National Weather Service (NWS). During the day, SKYWARN operators at NWS offices contact other NWS offices and other radio operators across the world.

SKYWARN operators manning the WX2BUF station at the Buffalo NWS office included STARS members John W2IV, John KA2RFT, Jack KB2ESM and Judy N2TEZ. They were joined by Dave AA2PF, Frank KC2JPQ, Jim N8JXR, Bill WB8JPX, Luke N2GDU, Bill KC2KTZ, Bill WA2AIV, Bob N3QOT, Bill WB2SXY and his wife Pam.



During the 24-hour event, they made 599 QSO's to hams in 47 states, including contacts with 55 other NWS offices. During the peak hours, they were operating four radios. Beside the permanent sloper antenna behind the office, they also installed two temporary antennas in front of the office. In the News

STARS member Mick Waclawski KB2MSW was profiled in the *Buffalo News* on Sunday, December 26. See: http:// www.buffalonews.com/editorial/20041226/1003535.asp.

The article is titled "*No longer taking life for granted*" and outlines Mick's life before and after a tobogganing accident in Delaware Park 24 years ago left him paralyzed from the neck down.

Prior to the accident, Mick had just been elected captain of the McKinley High School swim team and had enlisted in the delayed-entry program for the US Air Force.

After the accident, Mick worked hard to surpass the doctors' expectations and to build his life by trying to make the most of every day.

License Restructuring

Many hams are eagerly awaiting FCC action on amateur radio license restructuring. Unfortunately, the ARRL does not anticipate any changes in the Morse requirement or in any other amateur radio licensing requirements prior to 2006, possibly later.

The FCC continues to review thousands of comments that it received on 18 petitions for rule making. The various petitions called for eliminating or altering the Morse code requirement and changing other sections of the Amateur Service Part 97 rules, including further restructuring of the amateur licensing system.

Before the FCC adopts any changes to the Morse requirement and the license structure, it must complete its comment review, issue a *Notice of Proposed Rule Making (NPRM)*, and then invite further comments on the *NPRM*. The FCC will then review those comments before issuing a *Report and Order* that spells out any final rules. This is why the ARRL does not anticipate any changes prior to 2006. Until then, the 5 wpm Morse code requirement to gain HF privileges in the US will remain in effect and no proposed automatic upgrades and other rule changes will occur.

There has been a noticeable decline recently in people taking VE exams to upgrade their licenses, and many think that is because people are waiting to see what the FCC is going to do. If this is the situation that you find yourself in, you should realize that any changes will not be soon and may not occur at all. Studying to pass the current requirements for upgrading will be a quicker and perhaps surer path to obtaining the upgraded privileges that you want.

VE Exam Fees for 2005

Starting January 1, 2005, the fee charged all applicants at ARRL VEC-coordinated Amateur Radio test sessions (including STARS VE team exams) will increase from \$12 to \$14.

This fee is charged to anyone applying for a new amateur license or upgrading his or her operating privileges. Per the FCC, the test fee allow examinees one attempt to pass or fail each of the four examination elements.

Only if an examination element is being retaken after a failed test would a second test fee be charged.

The club repeater (WB2ELW/R) is located near Colden, NY (147.09/.69 output/input, with a PL of 107.2 Hz). Use a PL of 141.3 Hz for the Nike Base remote receiver.

STARS honorary southern repeater (KE2VW/R) is in Arkwright, NY (146.67/.07 out/in, with a PL of 107.2 Hz).

The club UHF repeater is located near Colden, NY (442.325 MHz with a PL access of 107.2 Hz.)
