STARS & ARRL Memberships

Membership in STARS is open to anyone with an interest in amateur radio. A license is not required. Membership applications may be obtained by sending a SASE to Judy Levan N2TEZ, 120 University Blvd., Depew, NY 14043, from the newsletter editor or from board members.

Annual Dues are payable on January 1 and are \$21 for a single membership, \$27 for family memberships and \$8 for a student membership (through grade 12). The dues are pro-rated on a monthly basis for new members plus there is an initiation fee of \$5 when first applying to the club. For example, a new member joining in July would pay \$10.50 (6 months X \$1.75 per month) plus the \$5 initiation fee for a total of \$15.50.



Applications should be returned to Judy N2TEZ along with the appropriate dues. The applications will be reviewed and voted on by the Board of Directors at the business meeting. The applications are then voted on by the general membership at the next regular club meeting.

Keep Your Summer Safe and Injury Free

Two comments before I begin. Join me in recognizing Judy Levan N2TEZ and her National Weather staff for presenting an excellent SKYWARN program at out April meeting. Each time I have attended this presentation I have always come away with a better understanding of their dedication and the effort put forth to keep the public informed. I especially like the NWS web site which is loaded with maps to meet any aspiring amateur forecaster's needs.

Secondly, this month we will have our first dinner meeting. Jim Sojka WB2TJO has done a wonderful job making all the necessary preparations to make this unique meeting a success. It continues to follow my commitment this year to provide you with a more relaxed and fun meeting experience. Like any meeting, this is open to the public and a good opportunity to bring a guest.

Besides my normal work load I have been busy completing safety training courses for my yearly personal development plan required by my employer. To give you an idea, here is a sample of what I have taken:

Spill Prevention Hazard Communications Gaseous Agent Fire Suppression General Emergency Preparedness Blood Pathogens Ladder Safety Emergency Evacuation

Most of these safety courses are yearly requirements and even though that may seem redundant I can't help but see them not only as important for my work but also for personal life. Look through this list and I think you will agree that some of them directly apply to amateur radio and most of them to our personal lives.

This summer we will all be working projects that require a level of safety awareness. Many of us will be working with ladders, power equipment, handling chemicals, working with electrical circuits, or using flammable liquids and materials. At times I tend to be in too much of a hurry to obey rules of safety. Safety practice reviews help me consciously think about what I really need to focus on.

My point is we may think we have the knowledge or skills to maintain a degree of safety but it is important to review the material on a regular basis. It would be comforting to know that all STARS members follow good safety practices. If you are interested in safety review courses I would be happy to provide you with the material at my disposal. In most cases safety knowledge and practices are the difference between life and death or serious injury.

Scouts Visit STARS Nike Base Club Station

On Saturday April 23, Terry Rockhold K2OO hosted a visit by members of Cub Scout Den 411 and Boy Scout Troop 411 of Hamburg, NY at STARS Nike Base club station. The scouts were also accompanied by adults, relatives and friends.

Terry explained the purpose of QSL cards and passed around several QSL cards received by WB2ELW from various countries. Each of the scouts was given a STARS WB2ELW QSL card to take home.



The scouts had a chance to experience local

communications over the STARS WB2ELW repeater. STARS Director George Ebert N2NOB talked to the scouts from his home station in Sloan, NY. STARS President Keith Patterson KC2DGC also visited with the scouts from his truck and then came to the Nike Base to meet them in person.

Keith and Terry talked about the role of amateur radio in providing emergency communications in disasters such as in hurricanes and in the ice storm that affected Eastern NY. A short video from the ARRL showed emergency communications in real life situations.

The scouts were also told about Jamboree-On-The-Air (JOTA) when scouts visit amateur radio stations to talk to scouts in other locations.



The use of digital communications was demonstrated by monitoring PSK31 transmissions from various states, Italy, Belgium and Russia.

A British special event station for the International Marconi Day was heard on SSB, and Terry made a two-way contact with a station in Lithuania.

The scouts were invited to visit STARS Field Day location in June.

New Two-Ham Team Takes Over Aboard ISS

International Space Station Expedition 10 crew members Leroy Chiao, KE5BRW, and Salizhan Sharipov have formally handed over command of the station to the Expedition 11 crew of Commander Sergei Krikalev, U5MIR, and US Astronaut and ISS Science Officer and Flight Engineer John Phillips, KE5DRY. A formal change-of-command ceremony was held aboard the ISS today (April 22).

"We are at the end of our mission," said Chiao, who headed the Expedition 10 crew. "Salizhan Shapirovich Shapirov and I look back with pride at our mission and accomplishments. We are proud to have represented the international partnership in space and to have moved us forward in our collective efforts to further our reach into the cosmos."

Chiao then handed the microphone over to Krikalev. "John Phillips and I are ready to accept the responsibility of operating and maintaining the ISS," the new commander said. "We will take good care of her and continue the forward push in our international efforts of space exploration." Chiao then formally passed command of the ISS to Krikalev, which he accepted. Accompanying Krikalev and Phillips on

the April 15 Soyuz "taxi flight" was European Space Agency (ESA) Astronaut Roberto Vittori, IZ6ERU, of Italy.

Over the past week, the five space travelers have been involved in various crew handover duties and briefings. And while the newcomers have been settling in, Chiao and Sharipov--who have been aboard the space outpost since last October--have been gathering up their gear, understandably eager to go home.

Krikalev, 46, and Phillips, 54, both have been aboard the ISS before. Now returning as the crew commander, Krikalev was a member of the very first crew to occupy the ISS in November 2000. By the time his Expedition 11 stay is over, Krikalev will have spent more time in space than any other human. Phillips was a member of the shuttle Endeavour STS-100 crew and coordinated two spacewalks at the ISS to install Canadarm2. He's been wanting to return ever since.

During his brief visit, Vittori conducted experiments aboard the station under a commercial agreement between ESA and the Russian space agency. He also put in a little radio time, talking to youngsters back on Earth during three Amateur Radio on the International Space Station (ARISS < http://www.rac.ca/ariss/) contacts.

On April 18, he conducted ARISS school group QSOs with two technical schools. One of the schools was named for wireless pioneer Guglielmo Marconi, and his daughter, Princess Elettra Marconi, assisted in the event and extended greetings to Vittori, at one point saying her father "would have been proud of you for your marvelous mission."

On April 20, Vittori answered questions from youngsters gathered at the European Space Research Institute (ESRIN) in Frascati, Italy. The ESA had invited more than 120 pupils from primary schools in the region to the event. All of Vittori's school group contacts were conducted in Italian. Special event station II0ESA will be on the air on HF from Rome until May 15 to celebrate the Vittori's flight.

The departing crew and Vittori will leave the ISS Sunday, April 24, aboard the Soyuz transporter that carried Expedition 10 into space last fall. They're scheduled to land that evening in Kazakhstan.

Although he made few casual Amateur Radio contacts, Chiao set an ARISS record during his duty tour by racking up a total of 23 ARISS school group contacts. The first Expedition 11 ARISS school group contact is scheduled for May 4.
