STARS VE SESSION

STARS will be holding a VE Test Session on Saturday September 18th. The session will be held at the Hamburg Youth Center (corner of Prospect and Hawkins Aves.)

All candidates should arrive by 9AM. Walk-ins will be allowed, but pre-registering will help speed up the processing the day of the test.

All candidates should bring the following to the test session:

- An original photo ID or two other original forms of ID, plus a photocopy of the ID(s) to be turned in to the examiners for their records.
- 2. Your current amateur radio license (if any) plus a photocopy of it.
- 3. The original copies of any applicable Certificate of Successful Completion of Examination (CSCE) plus a photocopy of each.
- 4. A test fee of \$15.00
- 5. Your Social Security Number (SSN) or your FCC Federal Registration Number (FRN). Your application for a new or upgraded amateur radio license will be rejected by the FCC if you do not provide one of these numbers.

ARRL VEC VOLUNTEER EXAM-INER SESSION PARTICIPA-TION WEB PAGE RETURNS

If you're an ARRL Volunteer Examiner (VE) who is interested in seeing how many ARRL exam sessions you've taken part in, you can find the answer on the VE Session counts Web page.

On this page, you'll be able to access a list that shows the total number exam sessions that each ARRL VE has conducted. The listings are listed first by state and then in alpha-numeric call sign order (call area number, then suffix letters). The state where an individual VE record is located is based on the VE's official address on file with the ARRL Volunteer Examiner Coordinator. Only currently accredited ARRL VEs will be displayed on the Web page.

ARRL VEC Manager Maria Somma, AB1FM, said she is "thrilled" that the enhanced page now includes the VEs name, as well as the call sign and session participation total: "Incorporating the name field in the lists added a higher level of authentication when determining a VEs accreditation status and participation. We applaud the volunteers whose dedication and service make the VE program successful. Your hard work and contribution of countless hours of your time helps ensure the future of Amateur Radio. Your efforts matter and we thank you. Our VEs should be very proud of their accomplishments."

STARS & ARRL MEMBERSHIPS

Membership in STARS is open to anyone with an interest in amateur radio. A license is not required. Membership applications may be downloaded from the club website or obtained by sending a SASE to Judy Levan N2TEZ, 120 University Blvd., Depew, NY 14043.

Annual dues are payable on January 1 and are \$21 for a single membership, \$27 for family memberships and \$8 for a student membership (through grade 12). The dues are pro-rated on a monthly basis for new members plus there is an initiation fee of \$5 when first applying to the club. For example, a new member joining in July would pay \$15.50 (6 months X \$1.75 per month plus the \$5 initiation fee).

Applications should be returned to Judy N2TEZ along with the appropriate dues. The applications will be reviewed and approved by the Board of Directors and then voted on by the general membership at the next regular club meeting.

SEPTEMBER - NATIONAL PREPAREDNESS MONTH

What is National Preparedness Month (NPM)? September is National Preparedness Month! This awareness month is sponsored by the Ready Campaign in partnership with Citizen Corps and the Ad Council. The campaign is designed to encourage Americans to take simple steps to prepare for emergencies in their homes, businesses, and communities.

There are four easy steps for you to take:

Step 1. Get A Kit

When preparing for a possible emergency situation, it's best to think first about the basics of survival: fresh water, food, clean air and warmth.

Recommended Items to Include in a Basic Emergency Supply Kit:

- <u>Water</u>, one gallon of water per person per day for at least three days, for drinking and sanitation
- Food, at least a three-day supply of non-perishable food
- Battery-powered or hand crank radio and a NOAA
 Weather Radio with tone alert and extra batteries for both
- Flashlight and extra batteries
- First aid kit
- Whistle to signal for help
- <u>Dust mask</u>, to help filter contaminated air and plastic sheeting and duct tape to shelter-in-place
- Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties for personal sanitation
- Wrench or pliers to turn off utilities
- Can opener for food (if kit contains canned food)
- Local maps
- Cell phone with chargers

Additional Items to Consider Adding to an Emergency Supply Kit:

- Prescription medications and glasses
- Infant formula and diapers
- Pet food and extra water for your pet
- Important family documents such as copies of insurance policies, identification and bank account records in a waterproof, portable container
- Cash or traveler's checks and change
- Fire Extinguisher
- Matches in a waterproof container
- Mess kits, paper cups, plates and plastic utensils, paper towels
- Paper and pencil

Step 2: Make a Plan

Make sure you have a family emergency plan. Your family may not be together when disaster strikes, so it is important to plan in advance: how you will contact one another; how you will get back together; and what you will do in different situations.

Family Emergency Plan:

It may be easier to make a long-distance phone call than to call across town, so an out-of-town contact may be in a better position to communicate among separated family members. Be sure every member of your family knows the phone number and has coins or a prepaid phone card to call the emergency contact.

You may have trouble getting through, or the telephone system may be down altogether, but be patient.

Emergency Information:

Find out what kinds of disasters, both natural and manmade, are most likely to occur in your area and how you will be notified. Methods of getting your attention vary from community to community. One common method is to broadcast via emergency radio and TV broadcasts. You might hear a special siren, or get a telephone call or emergency workers may go door-to-door.

Step 3: Be Informed

Being informed about the different types of emergencies that could happen where you live and the appropriate ways to respond to them will impact the decisions you make and the actions you take.

In addition, learn about the emergency plans that have been established in your area by your state and local government.

Step 4: Get Involved

After preparing yourself and your family for possible emergencies by getting a kit, making a plan and being informed, take the next step and get involved in preparing your community. Learn more about Citizen Corps or Citizens Emergency Response Teams (CERT), which actively involves citizens in making our communities and our nation safer, stronger and better prepared.

CONTEST LINGO

10-minute rule - Refers to a limit on the number of band changes permitted in an hour or how long a station is required to operate on a band after making a band change.

Alligator - A station whose signal is loud but cannot hear calling stations well.

Bonus - Extra points added to a score for making a specific type of contact, for contacting specific stations, or operating in a specified way.

Breakdown - A table showing the contacts and multipliers worked on each band.

Busted - An incorrect spot, call sign or exchange.

Cabrillo - A log format specification

Checklog - Submitted logs that are only used in the log checking process and are not listed in the results for competitive purposes.

Cut Numbers - Letter abbreviations for Morse numerals, such as N for 9 A for 1, T for zero, and so forth.

DQ - Disqualification as the result of rules violation.

Dupe - Duplicate contact, a station that has been worked before and can't be contacted again for point credit.

Exchange - The information that must be exchanged in a contest contact.

Hired gun - A guest operator, usually referring to someone highly skilled.

Hold - In reference to a frequency to maintain a presence on a frequency by calling CQ.

HP, **LP**, **QRP** - High Power; Low Power; Very low power below 5 watts average output power.

LCR - Log Checking Report, the output of the log checking process for a submitted log.

MO, MS, MM, M2 - Multi-Operator; Multi-Operator, Single Transmitter; Multi-Operator, Multi-Transmitter; Multi-Operator, Two Transmitter

Move - To coordinate a change to another band to contact station for additional multiplier credit.

Mult - Shorthand for multiplier.

Not In the Log (NIL) - A contact that can not be

cross-referenced to an entry in the log of the station with which the contact is claimed.

Off-time - Enforced periods of non-operation during a contest.

Packet - General term for the spotting network, originally implented via packet radio links.

Penalty - QSO points removed during the log checking process in response to errors.

QSO points - The point credit for a specific contact.

Rate - The equivalent number of stations that would be worked in an hour based on various time periods (last hour, last 10 minutes, last 10 stations, last 100 stations, and so forth).

Robot - A software program that processes logs submitted by e-mail.

Rover - A mobile station that operates while in motion or from multiple locations in a contest.

Run - To work stations by calling CQ; a run also means a steady stream of callers in response to CQs.

Search-and-Pounce (S&P) - The technique of tuning for stations to work instead of calling CQ.

Serial number - The sequential number of the contact in the contest -- first contact, second contact, 199th contact, and so forth.

SO, SOAB, SOSB - Single Operator; Single Operator, All-Band; Single Operator, Single-Band

SPC or **S/P/C** - State, Province, and Country (referring to DXCC entities); the most common three location-based types of multipliers.

Spot - An announcement of a station's call and frequency via a spotting network.

Spotting network - The interconnected system of sources of spots, consisting of Web pages, TELNET ports, and packet radio systems

Sprint - A short contest, usually six hours or less.

Sunday driver - Casual contest participants who appear late in the contest (usually Sunday afternoon) to make a few contacts

UBN - Unique, Busted, Not In Log; the three ways in which a contest can be judged to be invalid.

Unique - A call sign that was not in any other submitted log.
